Indicators	Operationalization
'What'? (Subject of Evaluation)	Laws, policies, programs, projects sectors, organizations, individuals
'Who'? (Institutions of Evaluation)	Independent public evaluation institution (e.g. state agencies), ministry evaluation departments, university and research institutes, consultants, evaluation departments within implementing organizations

'Which Criteria'? (Criteria of Evaluation)	Effectiveness, Efficiency, Outcome, Impact, Sustainability, Relevance, Significance (DAC- Principles)
'How'? (Approaches and Methods of Evaluation)	Objectives-oriented, Management-oriented, Consumer-oriented, Expertise- oriented, Participant-oriented (Fitzpatrick et al 2004)
'Which Objectives'? (Target of Evaluation)	Knowledge, Accountability, Development (Learning), Legitimacy (Stockmann 2006)
